The Six abodes of lord Murugan are in Tamil Nadu in India. The six most sacred abodes, as mentioned in the Tamil Sangam literatures are Palani, Thiruthani, Swamimalai, Pazhamudircholai, Thiruparankundram, And Thiruchendur.

Murugan temple or

Subramanya Swamy temple is

one of the six abodes of Lord Murugan
located at Thiruparankundram, 8 kms
from the city of Madurai in Tamil Nadu, India.

The temple is built in rock-cut architecture and
pelieved to have been built by the Pandyas during the 6th

believed to have been built by the Pandyas during the 6th century. According to the legend it is where Murugan slayed the demon Surapadman and married Deivayanai, the divine daughter of the king of heaven, Indra, and he is said to have worshipped Shiva here as Parangirinathar.

As per Hindu legend, Surapadma, a demon king, once obtained boons from Shiva on account of severe

penance. He started ruling the 1008 worlds on account of the power attained. He married Padumakomalai and had several sons. Viramkendiram became his capital, a city created in the seas and he started troubling the Devas. He imprisoned Indra (the king of celestial deities) and desired his wife Indrani. Indra sought the help of Muruga. Muruga sent his messenger Viravakutevar to the demon, but he was unmoved. A severe battle was fought in Thiruparamkundram where Muruga killed all the sons of the demon except Iraniyan. Surapadman hid under the sea in Thiruchendur where Muruga slayed & split him into two pieces, which went on to become the divine vehicles, peacock and rooster. The day when Muruga slayed Surapadma is celebrated as Skanda Sasshti festival in all the Murugan temples. Indra, the king of Devas was impressed and he married Deivayanai, his divine daughter

to Muruga at Thiruparamkundram. Muruga is believed to have worshipped Shiva here as Parangirinathar.

Tax credits for donations

You can claim 33.33 cents for every dollar you donated to charities or similar organisations.

You can only claim on donations that added up to the same amount or less than your taxable income during the tax year.

Who can claim

You can claim donation tax credits if you:

- are claiming as an individual and not on behalf of a trust, partnership or company
- were a New Zealand tax resident at any time during the tax year (1 April to 31 March).

What you can claim for

- You can claim tax credits for donations of \$5 or more when the donation:
- was to an approved organization
- did not provide any direct benefit to you or your family.

What needs to be on your receipt

You need a receipt for every donation you want to claim for. The receipt needs to:

- be in your name or your spouse or partner's name
- show the amount and date of the donation
- clearly state that it's for a donation
- be signed by an authorised person
- be on the organisation's letterhead or show its name a and official stamp
- show the organisation's IRD number and/or charities services number
- show the word 'copy' or 'replacement' if it's a replacement receipt.

If you want to claim for a donation of \$5 or more made over the phone you need a receipt from the approved organisation. A copy of your phone bill is not a receipt.
